



Private-Sector Jobs Created


December 2010 - September 2015, Seasonally Adjusted



- Since December 2010, Florida has had a 15.4% increase in private sector jobs while the nation as a whole has had a 10.9% increase.
- Florida had the fastest job growth rate of the ten most populous states.
- Florida added more private-sector jobs than Texas and New York over the year.



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







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
Total Employment In Florida

January 2005 – September 2015, Seasonally Adjusted




Total Unemployment In Florida

Wages

- 73.3% (691,400) of private sector jobs created are in industries with an average annual wage > \$40,000.
- 43.1% (407,000) of private sector jobs created are in industries with an average annual wage > \$45,000.
- Over the last year, real wages (inflation-adjusted) in the private sector are up 3.5%.


Enterprise Florida



Created by the Florida Legislature in 1996, Enterprise Florida, Inc. (EFI) is a public-private partnership between Florida's business and government leaders, and is the principal economic development organization for Florida.

EFI facilitates job growth for Florida businesses through recruitment and retention, international trade and exporting, promotion of sports as an economic driver, capital funding programs to assist small and minority businesses, and protection of military bases across the state.

Florida's Target Sectors





What is a Target Industry?



- Statutory criteria:
 - Future growth
 - Stability
 - High wage
 - Market and resource independent (exception for clean energy projects)
 - Industrial base diversification and strengthening
 - Economic benefits <u>with added emphasis on global trade and</u>
 <u>logistics</u>
- Cannot be companies with NAICS codes 5611 or 5641 except under certain circumstances
- List updated every three years

Qualified Target Industry (QTI) Tax Refund



- Tax refund based on net new to Florida jobs
- Average wage at least 115% of state or local wage
 - State \$49,340
- Requires 20% match from local community
- Must be a clear inducement
- Special considerations for Brownfield areas and Manufacturing companies paying 100% or greater of the average county wage
- Performance based

Competitive Projects Average Wage








Capital Investment by Sector FY 2014-15






