Dear Ms. Lerche,

I am writing to apply for the position of Interim Deputy Director with the South Florida Regional Planning Council.

I am currently Chief of Staff at the Tampa Bay Regional Planning Council (TBRPC) where I have worked for more than ten years. I was previously Director of Research and Planning, having also served as Senior Planner and Principal Planner. I have 22 years of planning experience, 20 of which have been with regional planning councils, including in California and Illinois.

My areas of expertise include economic development and analysis, transportation planning, the transportation-land use connection, regional planning, as well as resiliency and climate related planning. I have extensive experience in convening multiple government and non-governmental stakeholders on regional projects that serve and expand the public interest.

As the driving force behind the expansion of TBRPC's economic analysis program across new subject areas for more clients and across the state, I increased the Council's income from contracts and grants, and integrated urban design into a highly respected package of technical services for local governments. Examples of recent projects include an industrial land use study for Pasco County that is guiding current decision making on the allocation of industrial land in the county; studies on sea level rise impacts on the regional economy and on the regional transportation system in collaboration with three Metropolitan Planning Organizations; and initiating a widely cited recurring series of reports on the status of the state economy as COVID-19 forced widespread business closures. That expanded range and depth of services have contributed to the TBRPC's value for local governments.

As Chief of Staff, I am responsible for overseeing seven planners at TBRPC where we offer programs in environmental planning, disaster recovery and emergency management, Geographic Information Systems, urban design, economic development and climate resiliency. In this position I am part of the management team and as such consult on staffing needs, promotions, salaries, budgets, workload, and personnel issues. As part of this leadership role, I work with the Executive Director and the Deputy Executive Director to strategize broader council activities with our elected Council members, local governments, private clients, and the media. These tasks include outreach and engagement especially with regards to the technical assistance program and I have been frequently interviewed in the media about our work products. As TBRPC hosts the third annual regional resiliency leadership summit, I have a central role in developing content, planning panels, inviting speakers and developing talking points.

My responsibilities as Chief of Staff comprise developing project budgets and scopes, grant and contract management, and overseeing the delivery of final products, including writing reports, providing video media and design services. These duties include grant writing for state and federal funds, and contract development with local government partners and private sector clients. Our recent projects have received significant recognition. In 2018, I wrote a chapter of the Supplemental Environmental Impact Statement for the Tampa Interstate Study on behalf of FDOT for which I was awarded the George Treyz Award for Economic Analysis from REMI for excellence in economic analysis. In 2022, the Project Phoenix 2.0 preparation and disaster recovery tabletop exercise for first responders and small businesses impacted by hurricanes won the Governor's Hurricane Award. The regional resiliency action plan (the first climate action plan in the Tampa Bay area), and my study on the impact of Florida Red Tide on tourism were both widely cited. My study on the impact of COVID-19 on the economy led to the creation of a statewide economic analyst position at TBRPC that provided services to all the regional councils around the state. Moreover, I gave testimony to the Florida House of Representatives on the role of regional planning councils in coping with sea level rise around the state as part of hearings for the creation of the Resilient Florida grant program.

In Monterey, I supervised an electric vehicle charging station placement plan, as well as various freight projects including a rail intermodal study and a regional commodity flow study for all of central California. I managed and delivered the first greenhouse gas reduction strategy for the Monterey Bay area as part of the regional transportation plan. In Illinois, I worked on freight planning and legislation. Prior to my regional planning experience I worked as a Long-Range planner with Indian River County.

I believe that regional planning councils have the potential to be essential resources for local governments as they plan for their community's future. They can support cost sharing and specialized technical experts that can assist multiple local governments, while facilitating a collaborative approach to regional problems.



I have known Travis Kendall since he came to Miami Shores while I was serving on the Miami Shores Village Council. Travis exhibited leadership skills from the beginning of his tenure. He took on the management of a small department and a Planning and Zoning Board that was encountering a full schedule of renovations. He took the time to meet in person with many of the residents, contractors, and building teams who were anxious about their projects. I found it refreshing to review details with Mr. Kendall because he exhibited friendliness and engendered trust with his knowledge of zoning matters.

As soon as he arrived, Mr. Kendall was challenged with taking over the transmission of a Comprehensive Plan to the Department of Economic Opportunity (DEO) that had been unfinished when he arrived. This was an in-house Plan without contractual help. It is not a simple task to interpret and finish such a document, however, it was accomplished through building healthy relationships with DEO and Miami Shores Staff.

During the pandemic, many municipal planning and zoning departments our size, simply shut down. With the help of Mr. Kendall, our Department devised a very creative way to use an older wing of our Village Hall to enable some projects to go forward. Plans were submitted electronically, a tent was set up outside, and a sort of antechamber was set up for masked meetings. Travis led this way forward.

I know that Travis spent a lot of extra time when the Department was challenged by considerable growth and long P&Z agendas. And yet, when a new developer introduced the idea of a gas station to be located on a small vacant parcel adjacent to the C-8 Canal, that was when Mr. Kendall did his most outstanding work for us. He prepared a completely researched notebook containing a myriad of articles pertaining to the proposed use of the sensitive tract. This made it so much easier to understand the issues surrounding the use. We are mostly built out, and the issues were all new, so this expertise was especially welcome.

I have always found Travis Kendall to be congenial, cooperative, and caring. I think highly enough of his skill set to recommend him very highly to the Planning Council. Thank you for the opportunity.

My education includes a political science and urban planning degree from Hampton University. Additionally, I hold a masters degree in community

economic development from Southern New Hampshire University. Finally, I completed the Harvard University Certificate for Seniors in State and Local Governments.

My experience includes over 30 years in the planning, community and economic development profession. Over my career, I have served as the planning, economic and community development director in Baltimore, Atlanta, Washington D,C and Cincinnati,Ohio.

In Baltimore the department developed the city's first comprehensive plan in 30 years. The plan focused and included transportation, housing, public facilities and infrastructure elements. Also, in Baltimore I served on the Baltimore Regional Commission (BRC) as a member and chair of the Planning Committee. The city's comprehensive plan was also approved by the regional planning commission.

In Atlanta, I supervised a staff of 357 people with a \$32 million budget including planners, building inspectors, grant administrators, economic development specialist and housing/zoning inspectors. As the Commissioner of Planning and Community Development I represented the city on the Atlanta Regional Commission (ARC). As a member I served on the transportation and planning committee. While serving as the Commissioner I overhaled the building division and upgraded the computer and GIS systems for the department. The plan included significant community participation and interested organizations. The plan was approved by the City Council, The National Capital Planning Commission and Congress. This unique challenge was completed on time and on budget. This document is still being implemented today. After serving as a junior planner in Cincinnati while in the beginning of my career ,I was asked to return to Cincinnati as the planning Director. The department had been eliminated by the former mayor. The new mayor wanted to reestablish the department and I was contacted to renew the department. After developing the staff that was dismantled, I energized the department with confidence and encouragement,. Over the next 3 years we applied and was rewarded a \$3.5 million planning grant to develop our comprehensive plan while we started on updating our zoning code. After planning for the plan, staff developed significant input processes an a special element for the youth. After a 3 year process the plan was approved by the planning commission and city council. The plan also received a national APA National award for the best comprensive plan for a large city. This career highlight is the energy and motivation that I would like to bring to this

unique and important position.

Currently, I am serving as a consultant and visiting professor at FAU in Boca Raton.

Finally, I consider my unique education, experience and regional planning knowledge qualifies me for a serious consideration. I am very familiar with the region its opportunities and challenges. I have served on regional planning councils and commissions across the country. Please accept this letter as an expression of interest and description of why I am the right person for the position of Deputy Director and subsequently Executive Director of the South Florida Regional Planning Council (SFRPC).

South Florida has been my home for the better part of the past 20 years. I moved to the area from New York in 2004. In that time, I have been astonished at the rate of growth and level of development in South Florida from the perspective of real estate, transit, health care, quality of life, and arts and cultural offerings.

Affordability

One of the most significant changes in the past twenty years has been the dramatic uptick in cost of living in the area. The cost of housing has been at its all-time high as of late — while salaries and wages have gone up incrementally at best. Although, recently, there has been an influx of finance and technology businesses into South Florida, the area is still heavily dependent on tourism to create much of the economic development activity. The gap between the pay in that industry and the cost of housing alone, without regard to the cost of other living expenses, is significant and not easily overcome.

Traffic and Congestion

Additional major areas of concern include mitigating traffic and congestion and providing transit and transportation options that people want and will use. We can no longer afford to build bigger roadways as the prevailing solution to traffic congestion. The consequences of that approach have myriad unintended impacts that negatively affect the very quality of life that many have come in search of in South Florida. The last thing this area can afford is environmental degradation that comes from too many vehicles on the road. The beauty of the natural environment is one of the most influential and signature features of the South Florida area.

Travelling long distances to work, school, and other important life activities is not only detrimental to the environment; it also contributes to stressful lifestyles. Evidence of this is seen in the increased occurrences of aggressive driving and road rage. I was heartened by what I learned at SFRPC's recent conference on first and last mile

innovation and look forward to seeing more people opting to use transit as accessibility and effectiveness are increased through region-wide efforts to connect people directly to transit from their homes.

Resiliency

Lastly, the quality of life in this area is imperiled if we do not proactively work toward resiliency – throughout the state, region, and particularly in the coastal areas. Recent natural disasters have proven that the effects of hurricanes on coastal communities are socially and financially ruinous. There is no predicting how weather will unfold – in essence - the best defense is a strong offense. We need to apply the best prevailing environmental knowledge to proactively protect our communities now and into the future. There is no play book. The work insists that dedicated groups of people wake up every day with a goal of protecting the very essence of South Florida - the oceans, waterways, marine life, and the Everglades – the characteristics that makes the area geographically unique and financially sound.

None of these issues are simple to navigate – all of them are complex, multifaceted, and costly – requiring innovation, collaboration, and an unwavering commitment to find and continually refine appropriate solutions. It will also require the wherewithal and financial means to implement those same solutions. None of this can be done by one agency or in a vacuum – it requires robust collaboration and cooperation. I am the right person to lead these conversations and execute the resulting programs and initiatives.

As a South Florida leader, most recently as City Manager of Tamarac and as an Assistant City Manager in Fort Lauderdale and Miramar, I am uniquely qualified to lead the efforts of the SFRPC. I served as Vice President of the Broward County City Manager's Association for 3 years. I know how to reach successful outcomes and, in that role, along with a team of Broward County municipal leaders, we secured \$110 million in CARES Act funds for local cities.

I have excellent working relationships and have successfully partnered with the Florida Department of Transportation, Broward County, Broward County MPO, Broward Children's Services Council, the Broward Sheriff's Office, the Fort Lauderdale Alliance, the Southeast Urban Land Institute, as well as city managers throughout Miami Dade. I will endeavor to create and cultivate similar relationships throughout Miami Dade and Monroe County.

My experience in overseeing intergovernmental affairs for cities and working as a district representative of a United States House of Representatives member has provided me with a solid working knowledge of the federal government. It has given me insight into how to leverage local projects with federal funding. One recent example is a \$350,000 appropriation received by the City of Tamarac in December 2022 through Congresswoman Cherfilus-McCormick. Assistance Program. The funding was the result of a visit that I and representatives of the City had with the Congresswoman to discuss local needs and her priorities.

I understand the importance of writing compelling and practical grant applications and other requests for funding to secure desired outcomes. I have had success in approaching funders with innovative and effective projects that can be completed on time and on budget. In February 2023, the City of Tamarac received a Resilient Florida Program Planning Grant Award of \$414,000 for a citywide vulnerability assessment. This grant will provide the necessary funding to determine a baseline assessment of the City's critical infrastructure and facilities and uncover their vulnerabilities.

I am personally committed to South Florida and I am active in shaping what happens here. Although somewhat unique, South Florida is a microcosm of a fast-growing international urban area. SFRPC is uniquely positioned as a go-to organization to lead the conversations, facilitate collaboration, conduct research, make recommendations, and take action to effectuate change in the area - positively impacting the long-term livability and financial viability of the entire South Florida region long into the future. Leveraging the region's assets as Deputy Director would be one of my greatest professional challenges and privileges. I welcome the opportunity to put my energy, intellect, relationships, and experience at the service of SFRPC to create a blueprint for prosperity in South Florida that may be replicable in other parts of the United States and internationally.

Kathleen has significant depth in planning and economic development issues. The MPO has partnered with the City of Tamarac at her urging and under her leadership on two grant applications to the federal government - one to the US Department of Transportation for Strengthening Mobility and Revolutionizing Transportation (SMART) Grants Program. If awarded the project will integrate, manage, and disseminate high-fidelity transportation and resiliency data. It will also create a digital twin modeling platform to scale collaborative decision making and transparent communications. The other grant application was to the Thriving Communities grant program which, if awarded, will provide technical tools and organizational capacity to disadvantaged communities so that they may compete for federal aid and deliver quality infrastructure projects that enable their communities and neighborhoods to thrive.

For several years Kathleen has been working alongside FDOT to leverage a Commercial Blvd - fiber project for optimal benefit for the entire community. She has collaborated with the MPO and Broward County to understand how to get fiber throughout the entire Commercial Blvd corridor with good results. What started as a FDOT project beginning at Rock Island and extending to US 1 has now been extended from Rock Island to Pine Island through her efforts among others to get Broward County on board with the project. Ms. Gunn secured funding through the City's capital improvement budget to fund a feasibility study for the city to investigate jurisdictional issues and inter-agency cooperation required to make the project become a reality. She recognizes the regional benefit of fiber on this important corridor to the overall improvement to the transportation network even though the city would not be able to use that very same fiber for its purposes.
